I am proud to report that Tunbridge saw an 80% turnout for voting on Nov. 4th. Of the 997 registered voters, 786 cast ballots. There were 57 additions to the checklist this year. Of the 204 absentee ballots sent out, 202 of them were returned to be counted.

All Ballots are counted at the close of the polls by the Board of Civil Authority and other volunteers from town that are registered voters. We planned for a long night but with 12 teams counting all went smoothly and lights were out at the Town Hall by 11:00pm. A special thank you to my election workers; they spent 8-10 hours checking in voters and watching the ballot boxes.

## Tunbridge Select Board

As the Selectboard enters budget writing season, it has been wrestling with the question of where money can be saved, and what expenses are not negotiable. One option under serious consideration is closing the Town Hall for the coldest period of winter (January and February) to reduce the town's heating bill. Stockpiling an adequate amount of sand, salt, and gravel for the coming winter has been the most frequent topic of discussion with Road Foreman Rodney Hoyt. Prices for these essentials have been climbing steeply this year, especially for salt.

The Selectboard has worked on a number of other topics of special interest in the last few months. One is the restoration of the town pool, for which Recreation Director Thornton Hayslett has drafted a plan which appears very workable. It is our hope that this will be executed early next year. Another item is the continued progress of the ECFiberNet project, which after a legal review the town has now officially signed on to.

Finally, the Selectboard has discussed and encouraged the creation of a town emergency fuel assistance program for residents who are having difficulty meeting their heating expenses this winter. With the possible addition of a firewood "bank," this would be a program that would offer loans to be repaid monetarily or in community service. The first week in November was a very busy in the office, with the election and taxes due. Wendy and I decided that in four years we might move the tax deadline forward or backward a bit. Surprisingly the percentage of delinquent taxes was down from last year. The amount to be raised in taxes went from \$2,090,320 in 2007 to \$2,453,432 in 2008. The amount delinquent stayed almost the same at \$124,698 in 2007 and \$125,284 in 2008. This is good news, but I was not expecting this with the current financial situation.

The budgeting process has begun for fiscal year 2009/2010. The selectmen have agreed to look into a Heating Fuel assistance program for Tunbridge residents. Money available in the Special projects fund will be used as seed money. A steering committee will be set up this week; anyone interested can contact me here at the office. Also donations will be accepted for this fund. Checks should be made out to the Town of Tunbridge, and the memo line should say heating fuel assistance. If you have any questions call or stop by the office.

## **Tunbridge Board of Listers**

We would just like to correct a common misconception: At this writing we can state with assurance that Tunbridge property values are not falling.

A number of people have commented that they expect the value of their property to drop for the new reappraisal. Not true, and, speaking for those of us whose net worth is mostly in our home, thank goodness it isn't. A drop in appraised value would not mean lower taxes, just lower equity. In all the reports about prices dropping around the country, we have not heard that they are falling to back 2002 levels. Our town values are based on 2002 housing prices.

We have had fewer sales in the past two years, so our sample is small. Nevertheless our few arms-length sales indicate that town values are holding. According to an article in the October Vermont Property Owners Report, "Many brokers around the state confirmed that it was a slow summer. Even though buyers have gained the upper hand, however, prices in the state's biggest market—single-family primary homes—have stayed level." The article states that other markets showed more change: "Both primary and vacation condo prices are down... while single-family vacation homes registered a surprising 12.8% gain." According to the federal Housing Price Index, Vermont's primary and vacation home prices rose 1.6% from the second quarter of 2007 to the second quarter of 2008.

We shall see what happens to sales by April 1, 2010, which will be the basis for the reappraised values. My personal dream is that by then the state will have found some way other than property taxes to fund education and that some generous benefactor will provide money for all town expenses in perpetuity. Ah, then there will be no need for the Board of Listers, and I can work in my garden all summer and, in the winter, take long vacations in the Caribbean with the money I saved from not having to pay taxes.

What is up with fuel prices?

Don't get too relaxed. Petroleum products are very demand sensitive and the US consumer really cut back on gasoline purchase this summer. This scared off the speculators who had added to the cost. Now we have world wide reductions in demand due to the economic situation but all this will pass when the economy turns around. The bottom line is that drill as we might the world will not soon produce the amount of oil the market is calling for and prices will keep rising in the long term. Using our fuel thoughtfully will help a lot. In Europe people are driving four door good highway cars that get 60 miles per gallon and we should be demanding them as well. The plug in cars will become available in 2010. They will be more money to purchase and still use some fuel for our longer trips, but the electric portion of our driving will cost the equivalent of \$1 per gallon- so plan ahead. Propane is directly affected by oil prices as is fuel oil so plan to get an energy audit of your house and to move to some wood heat. Protecting our wallets will reduce our CO2 out put as well. Climate change is already hearting many third world populations and will cost us dearly in the future.

The Fire Department has spent some time this year reviewing and revising some of our corporate documents including our Mutual Aid Agreements with surrounding departments and our Standard Operating Guidelines for our members. Both documents had not been reviewed or updated in several years, so this gave us a chance to rethink processes and clarify departmental procedures.

The month of October gave us a chance to participate in a couple of community related activities including a fundraiser Ham & Bean Supper followed by a serenade of "Cowboy Poetry". Later in the month some members joined Smokey the Bear on a trip to the Tunbridge Central School to provide some fire safety education to the students in recognition to Fire Prevention month.

Following the signing of the contract for the new fire truck last July, the chassis has been ordered by our contractor. Several members of the department traveled down to the plant in the early fall to review the final specifications with the contractors. After reviewing the final specs with the contractor at the plant, some slight design enhancements were made to the apparatus. We expect to learn of the arrival of the chassis any day now so that the building of the truck can begin.

As a reminder, daylight savings time has just past us by again. Remember that this is the time when you should change the batteries in your smoke detectors and it is also a good idea to have your chimney cleaned.
